Greetings,

The month of October, within the Church, is devoted to the Most Holy Rosary, since its annual feast is Oct 7th. It is a very special day for me - I renew my own consecration to Our Lord and devotion to Our Lady each year on Oct 7th. I spend one month preparing for the renewal through particular reading, prayer, examination, etc. I hope you can refresh your own devotion to the Blessed Mother in whatever way suits you best. Options: the family rosary, or the family decade of the rosary (for those with young kids); the Angelus (with its bells) at 6am, Noon, 6pm; other Marian prayers; the morning offering, or another form of Marian devotion or piety.

October is also marked as Respect Life Month. There are resources from the United States Bishops on this website: https://www.respectlife.org/respect-lifemonth. It may seem strange that Catholics have a month focused on these items - doesn't everyone respect life? We no longer live in a Christian society which defaults to a Biblical approach to the human person and life issues, so it became necessary to bring attention to these issues in a particular way.

I want to ask you for your prayers and thank you for those you've offered for me. I just spoke at a conference in lowa with 5000 people and it went very well. I will be speaking at three locations around the Diocese of Reno this weekend, and then directing 20+ nuns on a their annual 8-day silent retreat. Prayer intention, along with prayers for safe travels: May God be glorified, and may many people advance in salvation and holiness.

Christian Teaching on Marriage / Catechism of the Catholic Church

1659 St. Paul said: "Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the Church. . . . This is a great mystery, and I mean in reference to Christ and the Church" (*Eph* 5:25, 32).

Christian marriage finds its basis in Christ.

Christ laid down his life for His Bride, the Church.

1660 The marriage covenant, by which a man and a woman form with each other an intimate communion of life and love, has been founded and endowed with its own special laws by the Creator. By its very nature it is ordered to the good of the couple, as well as to the generation and education of children. Christ the Lord raised marriage between the baptized to the dignity of a sacrament (cf. CIC, can. 1055 § 1; cf. *GS* 48 § 1).

The Sacramental union makes use of civil law and ecclesial law.

There is a twofold purpose: good of spouses; children.

1661 The sacrament of Matrimony signifies the union of Christ and the Church. It gives spouses the grace to love each other with the love with which Christ has loved his Church; the grace of the sacrament thus perfects the human love of the spouses, strengthens their indissoluble unity, and sanctifies them on the way to eternal life (cf. Council of Trent: DS 1799).

Spouses can love with Christ's love

Perfecting love; Strengthening bond; Increasing holiness.

1662 Marriage is based on the consent of the contracting parties, that is, on their will to give themselves, each to the other, mutually and definitively, in order to live a covenant of faithful and fruitful love.

Consent of bride and grooms consists in:

Freely giving self and choosing other.

Only the other, for whole of life.

Fruitfulness in society and open to having children.

1663 Since marriage establishes the couple in a public state of life in the Church, it is fitting that its celebration be public, in the framework of a liturgical celebration, before the priest (or a witness authorized by the Church), the witnesses, and the assembly of the faithful.

Christian marriage has a public nature.

Civil permission.

Ecclesial permission (bishop, priest, minister, preparation).

1664 Unity, indissolubility, and openness to fertility are essential to marriage. Polygamy is incompatible with the unity of marriage; divorce separates what God has joined together; the refusal of fertility turns married life away from its "supreme gift," the child (*GS* 50 § 1).

Unity forbids polygamy.

Indissolubility forbids multiple marriages.

Openness to fertility forbids refusal of fertility.

1665 The remarriage of persons divorced from a living, lawful spouse contravenes the plan and law of God as taught by Christ. They are not separated from the Church, but they cannot receive Eucharistic communion. They will lead Christian lives especially by educating their children in the faith.

"living" - Marriage ends only with death of a spouse.

"lawful" - Declaration of nullity studies church law.

1666 The Christian home is the place where children receive the first proclamation of the faith. For this reason the family home is rightly called "the domestic church," a community of grace and prayer, a school of human virtues and of Christian charity.

The Christian home is a participation in the church.

Further Information on Catholic Marriage Legal Matters

(This page is not attempting to give the full pastoral compassion necessary; it is briefly addressing the legal elements surrounding marriage. These matters are very serious.)

Marriage Preparation Guidance

Catholics are bound to follow Catholic law to get married. Weddings:

Prepared by Catholic representative (parish pastor or delegate)

All permission must be given through the church (bishop, parish pastor)

This includes: marriage preparation (initiated at least six months prior to wedding);

location of ceremony; officiant of ceremony; order of service for ceremony.

Once engaged, your first call should be to the parish, prior to all other considerations.

There needs to be an initial meeting to fill out the requisite form to begin marriage preparation, before which you cannot plan a wedding date at a church.

Pro tip: Don't set yourself up for frustration!

If you are married and did **not** do marriage preparation at a parish, and/or did **not** receive permission to get married from the Parish/Diocese, and/or did **not** have a Catholic officiant for the ceremony (or his delegate), we will need to bring your marriage into harmony with Catholic law. Please set up an appointment with Fr. Vasek by contacting the parish office and speaking with Norm.

Pro tip: Don't wait.

Separation, Divorce, Re-Marriage Guidance / Catholic Legal Next Steps

Introduction: The death of a spouse is the only dissolution of the sacramental marriage bond. A civil divorce does not in itself end a Christian marriage.

Separation

If you and your spouse have separated, nothing needs to be done.

Civil Divorce

Situation 1) If you have a civil divorce decree, and are not going to attempt another marriage, nothing needs to be done.

Situation 2) If you have a civil divorce decree, and desire to attempt another marriage in the future, your marriage needs to be studied by the Tribunal to see if a declaration of nullity can be granted. There is no guarantee one way or another about that outcome. You are not free to pursue a marriage until the Tribunal would grant a declaration of nullity regarding a current marriage.

Re-Marriage

If you have a civil divorce decree from a first civil union (marriage), have entered into a second civil union, yet your first civil union was not studied by the Tribunal to see if a declaration of nullity could be granted, you will need to pursue a declaration of nullity. You also need to call the parish and schedule a meeting with Father Vasek so that he can help you along the process.



LETTER FROM THE CATHOLIC BISHOPS OF MINNESOTA ON THE 2024 ELECTION

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS

As we approach the 2024 election, we encourage you to reflect on the virtue of faithful citizenship. As Catholics, our spiritual life and public life are not separate. Rather, our prayer and sacramental life informs our conscience, guides our actions, and sustains us in our efforts to build a just society.

In our representative form of government, voting remains a significant responsibility. Those we elect to office make critical decisions on our behalf, and therefore, we should participate in the electoral process with informed consciences, nurtured by prayer.

As faithful citizens, the principles of Catholic Social Teaching are the foundation for discerning how to vote and advocate for policies that promote the common good. The Church's social teaching reflects the Gospel's call to love our neighbor. promote the common good, and uphold the dignity of every human person. These principles give Catholics the tools to live out our personal call to holiness despite the challenges of modern society and to share the truths of the faith. Understanding current issues through the mind of the Church informs our conscience to vote and act accordingly. Although national elections draw much attention, state and local politics directly impact the quality of life of our families and communities. Therefore, our engagement at the local level is vital.

As we discern our choices, let us remember that no candidate is likely to align fully with our positions. And although we may not find a presidential candidate, for example, who aligns with all our values, that is not an excuse to abstain from voting altogether. There is a full ballot of candidates, each with the potential to shape our communities and our future.

As we prepare to vote, let us consider the following when evaluating candidates:

At All Levels:

- Who will work to protect life from the moment of conception?
- Who will respect the liberty of the Church and the rights of all believers to practice their faith?
- Who will defend the rights of free speech and assembly, necessary for a properly functioning democracy?

At the Federal Level:

- Who will promote peace among nations and reject the escalation of violence as a means of conflict resolution?
- Who will exercise fiscal responsibility and avoid burdening families with inflation and debt?
- Who will work for a just and comprehensive immigration policy that respects the wellbeing of both American citizens and migrants?

At the State Level:

- Who will oppose the legalization of assisted suicide?
- Who will promote economic security for families, including access to housing?
- Who will uphold the rights of parents and support parental choice in education?
- Who will steward our state's natural resources responsibly?

At the Local Level:

- Who will advocate for public safety that protects citizens, respects victims, and offers restoration opportunities for offenders?
- Who will ensure harmful materials are kept out of public libraries?
